Reopening, check. Getting back to the ways things were before? I believe you have heard it too – "Things are not going to be the same." To which perhaps you've responded like me: "Yes, but why be sad or fearful, why not build on the best of what we were doing before, seasoned by what the pandemic taught us. And what is it that is going to restrain us?"

What we have heard from nationally broadcast experts/officials appears to me to have produced fear and implies foolishness on our part. But we can think for ourselves and eventually the guidance catches up with our common sense. If you are vaccinated for the flu you are not likely to catch it or transmit the flu. I haven't been shown evidence that COVID-19 is different. But, let us step away from that rabbit hole, I am writing to you about our life together as church, the body of Christ in our locations, and these time in which we live.

The mission Jesus entrusted to His church rises above social and cultural strife. And offers its own guidance for being the church in all circumstances. So let us discern together the best God serving and glorifying things we did before. And let us look again, listen anew to God's Word in the context of all we have gone through. Embrace the joy of our Christian identity.

Along this line of discernment this quote, along with the Holy Spirit, gave me some food for thought regarding our priorities as the body of Christ going forward.

"What if church invited people to come and tell what they already know of God instead of to learn what they are supposed to believe?"

"What if it blessed people for what they are doing in the world instead of chastening them for not doing more in church?"

"What if the church's job were to convince people that God needs them working in the world more than God needs them sitting in the pews?"

Barbara Brown Taylor presumes her readers have faith that God is active in all aspects of their lives and take seriously the call to testify with their lives of God's love and good will for the world. Luther wrote about this naming it "Christian vocation." That as believers redeemed from sin's power by the Grace of God, we should approach work and all aspects of life with a grace informed perspective. And see co-workers, and all others as also glorifying God as they bring their best according to the gifts and spirit provided by God. It may not be that they don't know this, rather they may not know in Christian fellowship we celebrate all the good God is accomplishing in the world through ordinary people. Pew time is an important aspect too.

Before I came across this quote, God had convicted me to not preach to you what you ought to believe; you're already attending church. Rather affirm the faith working in you and lift up how our Lord and master is blessing the world and our lives through our obedience to His good will.

We come to worship and are glad to be a part of a church which has Christian education for the children and serves others in many ways including funeral dinners and making guilts.

I invite you to ponder and pray about additional ways God is calling us to be the body of Christ together in these times. Let us not be restrained or divided by external worldly ideas, rather freely live in the new life we have in Christ, preparing us for the life to come.

BTW, if you have read this, don't keep your thoughts to yourself, pray and visit with others in our church family, and beyond, and bring the best fruit of those conversations to the table.

Finding Paradise

Perseverance is a familiar quality for Mon, who after spending decades living as a refugee from an early age was recently able to place roots in Iowa and succeed in building a life for his family.

After living in a Nepali refugee camp for almost 24 years, Mon's family was able to resettle in the U.S. When they arrived in Iowa, they moved directly into a tiny apartment. But the single room was not sufficient for their family – especially once their youngest daughter was born. They stayed in the apartment for four years, but Mon was determined to create a better home for his family.

Mon secured housing for his family through the Habitat for Humanity program, and through LSI Refugee and Immigrant Services, he was able to get on track and save and earn money towards his goal of homeownership. With guidance from staff in LSI's Match and Save financial program, he was able to open a savings account and develop a monthly savings plan.

Mon and his family moved into their new home last year, and he said LSI and Habitat for Humanity were critical steps in helping him learn about U.S. finances and savings – lessons that will pay off during his journey as a homeowner.

"I felt very sad when I left my country," Mon says. "I felt as if I lost my paradise. But when I got the key and when I entered my house, I felt that I regained my lost paradise. So that was the happiest moment in my life and right now, I, my family, and kids are super happy to live in this new house."

Here's an idea, a place to start.

"God's work. Our hands." Sunday is Sunday, September 12, 2021. This day is an opportunity to celebrate who we are as the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America – one church, freed in Christ to serve and love our neighbor.

Service activities offer an opportunity for us to explore one of our most basic convictions as Lutherans: that all of life in Jesus Christ – every act of service, in every daily calling, in every corner of life – flows freely from a living, daring confidence in God's grace.

"God's work. Our hands." Sunday provides an opportunity to serve our neighbors in new ways and with new partners. It also provides an opportunity to gain new insights, to be renewed in faith and to gain fresh strength for serving in all our daily callings. This resource offers suggestions for small group discussion and individual reflection that explores the relationships we have when we are baptized into Christ's life. Loving, liberated service to others is more than a one-time or even ongoing activity.

Being baptized into Christ's life creates a whole new world of relationships — with God, with others and even with ourselves — that is characterized by loving, liberated service.

The goal of these suggestions for study and discussion is to explore the relationships that we have in Christ as loving, liberated servants. Listed below are some suggestions for thinking and talking with others, grouped by the number of people involved. Each grouping includes a variety of suggestions to fit your personal interest or local needs.

- A quick dip suggests a few questions or prompts for a brief exploration of this activity as part of a whole baptismal life filled with loving service. You can do one briefly while you travel to a work location or at the beginning of your activity.
- Wading in suggests some possibilities for 30-60 minutes of conversation before or after the service activity on the same day.
- Diving deeper suggests some possibilities for in-depth reading and discussion of a short book as a whole community in two to three sessions. (these sessions can also be adapted for small group or individual uses.)
